A Special Collaboration to Extend Breast Cancer Awareness

Breast Cancer Foundation, KK Women's and Children's Hospital and Science Centre Singapore set up exhibition on the disease

- In a unique collaboration to bring about greater awareness of breast cancer to the general public, the Breast Cancer Foundation (BCF) and KK Women's and Children's Hospital (KKH), together with Science Centre Singapore (SCS), have set up an interactive exhibition on Breast Cancer.
- 2. The exhibition delivers a holistic experience through a creative mix of audio, visual and sensory displays of real-life images, specimens and equipment. Visitors can learn about the science of breast cancer, common misconceptions and types of cancer treatments available as well as medical advancements that have been made. Stories from cancer survivors are also highlighted at the exhibition.
- 3. On display at the centre for a year till 8 October 2011, the Breast Cancer Exhibition is part of a larger effort to extend awareness of the disease beyond the Breast Cancer Awareness Month in October each year.
- 4. The month of October is celebrated each year as Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Engaging women and their families through events, talks and promotional efforts over the years has helped raise awareness about the need for regular mammogram screening and how early detection can save lives and breasts. However, every year, over 1400 women are diagnosed with the disease, and more than 320 women still lose their lives to it¹.
- 5. A National Health Surveillance Survey in 2007 revealed that 83.2% of women aged between 50 and 69 years were aware of mammography, but only 40.9% of women in that age group have had a mammogram in the preceding two years.
- 6. Breast cancer is a cancer that has a definite early or pre-invasive stage better known as Ductal Carcinoma In-Situ or DCIS. It commonly shows as abnormal changes on screening mammograms with no palpable lump or symptoms clinically. If diagnosed

at this stage, near 100% cure rates may be achieved and chemotherapy is not needed as part of the treatment, according to Dr Hong Ga Sze, Senior Consultant and Head, KK Breast Department, KKH.

- 7. "KK Breast Centre at KKH sees around 300 new cases of breast cancer every year. Even with awareness of the disease and the need for early detection, it is unfortunate that so many women still show up so late with their cancers. We hope that this special exhibition on Breast Cancer will further increase awareness to a larger portion of the Singapore population," added Dr Hong.
- 8. "Breast cancer is not just a woman's issue. All members of society, including men, can play a pivotal role by spreading the early detection message. The Breast Cancer Exhibition at the Science Centre, the first of its kind to be held in Singapore, will further reinforce BCF efforts to educate and encourage more women to go for screening at the recommended frequency. BCF's objective is to eradicate breast cancer as a life-threatening disease through early detection," said Mrs Noor Quek, BCF Vice-President.
- 9. "Every year, many healthcare and government agencies organize forums and events to increase awareness of this disease, to raise funds for cancer research and remind women to be breast aware for early detection, but it is never enough. I am glad that Science Centre has stepped up to play a role in this national effort by staging an exhibition on Breast Cancer. This exhibition is symbolic of the fact that education, awareness, and research into such diseases should be a constant thing," said Associate Professor Lim Tit Meng, Chief Executive, SCS.
- 10. In conjunction with the exhibition, events and activities such as public talks, movie screening and onsite mammogram screening are also planned throughout the period. Kicking off the series of activities will be a talk and healthy cooking demonstration session by local celebrity chef, Devagi Sanmugam, at the Science Centre on 11 December 2010.
